# PARKING LOT/ SIDEWALKS

- Lighting
  - Area lit adequately
- Curbs
  - Visibility
  - Proper painting
- Cracks
- Holes





# **>** ENTRANCE

- Mats
  - Proper placement
- Signage
  - Proper usage of signs when needed



### **AISLES**


- Always Clear
  - Travel Lanes for pedestrian and forklift traffic
- Trip Hazards
  - Extension cords
  - Totes
  - o Pallets





### **)** FLOORS

- Dry
  - Clean up spills
- Marked Walkways
  - Pedestrians
- Vehicle Aisles
  - Forklifts
  - Equipment








# **EXITS**

- Never Blocked
  - Unobstructed access
    - 3ft on each side
    - No dead end hallways
- Lighted Signs
  - Requirements
  - Emergency EvacuationPlan





# DEMERGENCY EVAC PLAN

- Training
  - Gathering Points
- Two Alarm Tones
  - Fire
  - Weather
- Drills
  - 2 per year
  - Reporting Procedures





## **STORAGE RACKS**

- Weight Limit
  - Marked with the load bearing limit
  - Must be anchored
- Height Limit
  - Stacked items:
    - Limited to not create hazard
    - Not block exit sign
  - Heavier items stacked on the bottom
- Organized



### FIRE EXTINGUISHER

- Training

  - "PASS" training Initial employment
  - Annual
- Type
  - Proper one for your company
- Monthly/Annual Inspections

  - Company inspection monthly Fire extinguisher company annual inspection
- Signage
  Never left on floor







# COMPRESS GAS CYLINDERS

- Storage
  - Oxygen and Acetylene kept 20 ft. apart
- Firewall
  - Used between stored bottles
- No Smoking Signs
  - Posted near the oxygen bottles being stored or in use
- Caps
  - Bottles must be capped when not in use





#### **Keeping Up with Housekeeping - Losses**

- Real Life Losses
  - Slip and fell in water on bathroom floor left knee injury
    - Incurred cost: \$ 57,500.00
    - Lawsuit Filed
- Injuries effects:
  - Hidden Cost
    - Production Lost
      - Who saw the accident
      - Who came to see what happened
    - Additional time spent
      - Paperwork
      - Recruiting and training new employee if necessary
    - Possible Increase of premium



#### **Keeping Up with Housekeeping - Losses**

- Real Life Losses
  - Sitting in the storage room, chair fell from the top shelf head injury
    - Incurred cost: \$ 2,259.16
- Injuries effects:
  - Hidden Cost
    - Production Lost
      - Who saw the accident
      - Who came to see what happened
    - Additional time spent
      - Paperwork
      - Recruiting and training new employee if necessary
    - Possible Increase of premium

- 1. Assign responsibility
- Make a Check List
  - Daily
    - beginning and end of all shifts
  - Monthly
- Conduct Safety Meetings
